

- Is at its core, our expression of theology and identity as an Episcopal Church.
- What does it mean to be an Episcopalian?

What is a resolution?

- A formal expression or will of an official body, adopted by a vote.
- In essence, a resolution expresses the will, practice or belief of the Episcopal Church
- It defines our identity as Episcopalians
- It defines who we are to each other and the outside world.

Types of Resolutions:

- A resolutions CCABs
- B resolutions Bishops
- C resolutions Dioceses/Provinces
- D resolutions Deputies
- X resolution Dispatch of Business
- E resolutions Elections

Type of resolution part 2

- Constitutional/Canonical/Rules of Order Changes — changes to the governing function of the church;
- Adoption of liturgies, music, prayerbooks, etc.;
- Expressions of Church Policy and Practice;
- Creation of committees, commissions, task forces;
- Expressions of belief, practice, or theology of the Episcopal Church; and
- Budget.

Role of the committee

- Review the resolution
- Collect input and conduct hearings
- Refine the resolution
- Recommend action on the resolution
- Consider changes made by the other House
- Propose resolutions within its purview

The process for perfecting a resolution





Referred to Committee by Presiding Officers



Resolution is reviewed by Committee



Committee conducts a hearing



The concurring house's Committee reviews any changes and/or changes its recommendation



House of initial action sends to the other house (concurring house)



Resolution is sent to the first house of initial action for consideration



Committee revises resolution and makes a recommendation



The Concurring
House votes

Who owns the resolution after it is proposed?

- Not the proposer;
- Not the committee;
- The General Convention.

Recommendations a committee can make:

- Adopt/concur
- Adopt with Amendment
- Adopt a substitute
- Adopt a consolidated substitute
- Reject
- Refer
- Take no further action

Consolidation

- Often times multiple resolutions are proposed on a single subject;
- The Committee's responsibility is to look for ways to combine and create an expression of the Episcopal Church on the subject;
- Multiple conflicting resolutions could be ruled out of order after one is acted upon.
- · Action can mean, adopt, concur, reject, take no action, or refer
